- 4th of July Parade: plans, assignments and sign-making

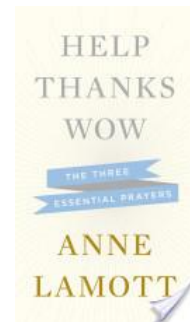

What?!

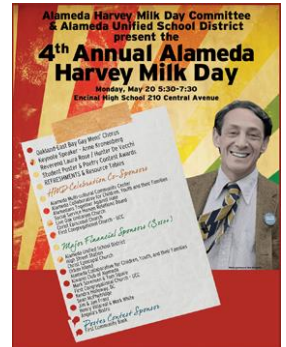

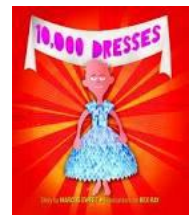

I also encourage trans authors to write books for teens--if you do, let me know (and if you are trying to get it published, let me know too!)"
