Hail ... and Farewell

Welcoming a New DRE & Teacher; Saying Goodbye to Another

We are delighted to introduce our new Director of Religious Education (DRE) & Teacher, Michelle Mueller. Everyone will all have a chance to meet Michelle on Sunday, September 1.

Michelle will work part-time for us and part-time in the same role for the Berkeley Fellowship of UUs. It is wonderful to have yet another connection to our sister fellowship. *But that's not all ... no that is not all!* Michelle is also pursuing a Ph.D. in Religious Studies at the Graduate Theological Union (GTU) in Berkeley.



Michelle (pictured at right with her partner) is excited about the possibility of having children & families from Live Oak and those from the Berkeley Fellowship participate in activities together – social events and possibly offering Our Whole Lives (OWL), the UUA's liberal values-based sexuality education program, for a joint class.

Michelle, who earned her M.Div. from the Pacific School of Religion (Berkeley), previously served as DRE for two congregations: the UU Church in Cherry Hill, NJ and the First UU Church of Stockton. She says, "These are all congregations of different sizes. I have come to understand what leadership is needed for different sized congregations and am interested in supporting the Live Oak UU Fellowship in its current phase."

We will also explore the possibility of Michelle helping us with Adult Religious Education. She is Wiccan. Perhaps there is interest in learning more about pagan and neopagan traditions. (Michelle will teach *NeoPagan Liturgy: Earth Ritual* at Starr King School for the Ministry this spring and is the volunteer Chair of the [Pagan Studies Salon](#) (also part of the GTU). She is also on the faculty for Cherry Hill Seminary, the only Pagan seminary offering graduate degrees. She teaches courses on family ministry, interfaith, and Greek religion.

She notes, "I have been oriented towards ministry my entire life." She was raised in a Lutheran family, but developed an abiding interest in Wicca at age 12. She became acquainted with Unitarian Universalism through interfaith involvement in high school and college, and solidified the relationship in seminary and as a DRE.

“My ministry celebrates transitions ... growing up, coming of age, coming out, *Our Whole Lives* and emotional development, handfastings, weddings, and supporting people through separations and deaths,” Michelle adds.

And, of course, Live Oak is about to go through a transition. We have been blessed to have Cecilia Owen as our children’s teacher this past year. Please join us Sunday, Aug. 18, Cecilia’s last day with us, to celebrate her ministry with us and send her off to her next adventure (a ministerial internship in St. Louis, MO) with all our love and best wishes. We will all be holding her in our hearts and hope to see her back in the bay area in the future.

New Accessibility Certification Program: Pilot Congregations

Live Oak’ers are proud that we value accessibility (we are wheelchair accessible; offer large print hymnals & orders of service; and assisted listening devices.)

The UUA and EqUUal Access recently selected [nine congregations](#) to field test an accessibility certification program. The congregations vary in membership size and are located in different areas of the country. During the next two years, the nine congregations and EqUUal Access, with the guidance of a UUA staff member, will create a fully vetted certification program available to all UU congregations. When they are done, Live Oak will certainly look into it to see if we qualify for certification – and/or what more we can do to reach that goal. Thoughts for Parents

(from pamphlet: *UU Kids Say ... Church Through the Eyes of Our Children*, ed. by Beth Graham)

The topic was Easter in the children's chapel service in a Unitarian Universalist congregation. After hearing the story, the children were full of questions. "Was Jesus a god or something?" "Why did they kill him?" "Didn't it hurt?" And the ultimate query, "What happens when you die, anyway?" Whether responding to the sight of a dead bird, a tragedy in the news, or a beautiful sunset, children are seekers of meaning, attuned to the spiritual dimensions of life.

As Jeanne Harrison Nieuwejaar writes in [The Gift of Faith](#), "Whether we wish it so or not, our children are religious, spiritual beings.... We cannot choose whether they will be religious, but we can choose how and to what extent we will support, guide, and celebrate this dimension of their nature."

Parents are children's primary religious educators and spiritual guides, but parents do not always feel equipped to fulfill this role alone. It is said, "It takes a village to raise a child." The congregation can be the parents' partner in this important endeavor.

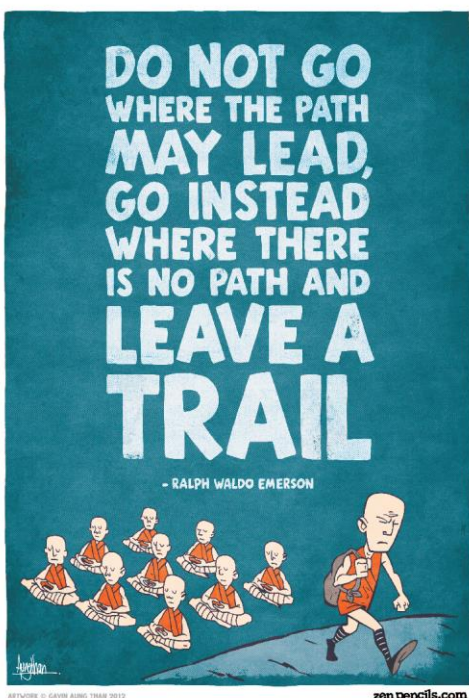
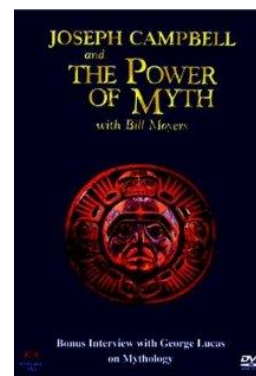
