New Choir Director / Pianist Helps Grow Our Choir

We are delighted to introduce our new Choir Director & Pianist, **Adrian Borcea**. His piano music is already delighting all on Sundays. And the choir thoroughly enjoys working with him. In fact, the choir is growing in numbers, as well as in musical skill!

Adrian is originally from Bucharest, Romania. He attended a special High School of Music in Bucharest before moving to Portland, Oregon, to continue his studies. Several of his original compositions were performed in a fundraising show produced by the [Snowman Foundation](#) (formed to fill the gap in music left by a lack of funds in Portland schools). While a student, Adrian was awarded second place in the Piano Concerto Competition, performing J. S. Bach's Clavier Concerto D minor. He currently is a vocal coach, composer, piano teacher (SF State and private lessons), and pianist / choir director for us and another church in San Francisco.



Adrian earned a Masters in Music in piano performance from San Francisco State University where he won the first William Corbett-Jones Piano Award. He and his wife (also a musician) are the founding directors of the [Forest Hill Concerts Series](#) which sponsors performances by varying musicians every Sunday in San Francisco.

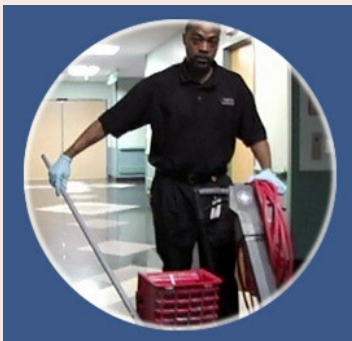

Social Justice & Service Group Presents a Film Series: Starts This Sunday, September 13, 4:00 p.m.

Beginning this month, Live Oak will host a monthly documentary film series on the 2nd Sunday of each month. The Social Justice & Service Group (SJSJG) team are excited to share *Unnatural Causes*, the acclaimed documentary broadcast by



PBS and now used by thousands of organizations around the country to tackle the root causes of our alarming socio-economic and racial inequities in health.

Unnatural Causes crisscrosses the nation uncovering startling new findings that suggest there is much more to our health than bad habits, health care, or unlucky

genes. The social circumstances in which we are born, live, and work can actually get under our skin and disrupt our physiology as much as germs and viruses.

Join others this Sunday, September 13 (4:00 p.m.) in the Guild Room (the building behind the sanctuary) to watch the first episode, [In Sickness and In Wealth](#), followed by the opportunity to discuss the issues brought up in the film. There is a short clip of the film on [our website](#).

Adult Education / Faith Development: Watch and Discuss Carl Sagan's Cosmos 3rd Fridays

On the 3rd Friday of each month, starting Friday, September 18, Live Oak adults will gather to watch one episode of Carl Sagan's [Cosmos: A Personal Journey](#). This show has been considered highly significant since its broadcast.



In the first episode, *"The Shores of the Cosmic Ocean,"* Sagan describes the cosmos and a "Spaceship of the Imagination" (shaped like a dandelion seed). The ship journeys through the universe's hundred billion galaxies, the Local Group, the Andromeda Galaxy, the Milky Way, the Orion Nebula, our Solar System, and finally

the planet Earth.

Eratosthenes' successful calculation of the circumference of Earth leads to a description of the ancient Library of Alexandria. Finally, the "Ages of Science" are described, before pulling back to the full span of the Cosmic Calendar. Note: the revised version of the series adds an introduction by Ann Druyan to this episode, recorded after Sagan's death, in which she discusses some of the changes that occurred in the years after its broadcast.

We will gather for 13 monthly sessions. Come for one, a few, or all of them. We'll meet at a home in Oakland. [Email Lisa](#) for the location -- or to let us know you will

Small Group Ministry: Interested In Joining a Group?

Sometimes known as "covenant groups" and "chalice circles," [Small Group Ministry](#) is a vital part of many Unitarian Universalist congregations. Groups of 8 - 12 people meet regularly, usually monthly, to reflect on and discuss significant life topics.

Small groups are a great way to get to know other people -- and to get to know yourself. Over time, participants build deep connections with one another, with the congregation, and with the sacred.



Whether the topic is "good and evil," "mindful living," or "letting go," the conversation is respectful and caring and leads to greater understanding. In each session, facilitated by a member of the congregation, all participants have an opportunity to share their perspectives, tell their stories, and listen deeply. The time together is structured: Groups begin and end with centering readings and often include a time of silence before the sharing begins. Many small groups engage in annual service projects, putting their faith into action.

Live Oak UU currently has two Covenant Groups: one meets twice a month on Wednesday evenings (in different members' homes); one meets once a month, almost always on the first Friday of each month (in a home in Oakland). The Wednesday group would be happy to welcome 1 new member. The Friday group would be delighted to welcome 1 or 2 new people. (Both groups include men, women, singles and paired folks of various orientations.) If we have enough people interested in being part of a group, we might be able to start a 3rd group.
