For tax purposes, ask Roger for a donation receipt when you drop items off. And Roger will bundle up anything not sold and take it to Clausen House.

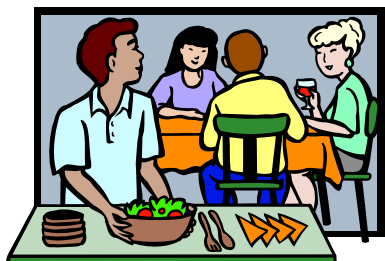
